 Hi everyone. I'm Dan Herbert, and I am the Library Buildings Development Manager at Queen Mary University of London.
- What do you most enjoy about your job?
 The mix of people I get to work with on a day-to-day basis. I work closely with a wide range of people, from senior managers in the library and across the university,



colleagues in estates, library colleagues, university security, suppliers, contractors, student union representatives, students and peers in other institutions. This definitely keeps things interesting, and there is always something new to learn.

• What motivates you in your work?

Knowing that what I do can make a real difference to all our users. It's really important to me that our libraries feel welcoming and inclusive for everyone.

• How can/has the M25 Consortium supported you in your career?

In so many ways. From the training and career development opportunities to networking, which allows for benchmarking and knowledge sharing with others. Not forgetting the visits to other libraries. Always a great source of inspiration (and for shamelessly stealing good ideas)

• What would it surprise people to know about you?

During the late 80s and 90s, I was involved in the alternative music scene in London. I sang in two "punk" bands, Juice and Swine, and was involved in lots of gigs.
