Who are you, where are you based and what do you do?

I am Dr. Janice Fernandes. I am the Academic Support Manager at the University of West London. I am also the Subject Librarian for the School of Medicine and Biosciences and the London College of Music. I lead academic support for a group of designated schools while working with colleagues to deliver information literacy to students and staff.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

This dual role has provided me with a nice mix of collecting evidence to frame policies and guidelines at one end and seeing them applied at the other. My liaison with academics has provided

me with an understanding of the expectations of the academic education arena in the UK. Simultaneously, engaging with the students through information literacy sessions and personalized interactions gives me a view of how students think, write and work; this helps shape further projects focused on student engagement. What motivates you in your work?

My strongest motivator is the satisfied faces of students when they understand the literature review; those sighs of relief when the referencing has been sorted out, and the jubilation when they achieve a good grade. Artificial Intelligence excites me, inspires me and often frightens me! Yet I am keen to learn more and have a voice in the ongoing conversation both in terms of supporting researchers as well as thinking about Academic Integrity and the future of university education in the years to come.

I am truly blessed to have an amazing line manager and great colleagues who continue to excite and challenge me through their thought-provoking questions in the room.

How has the M25 Consortium supported you in your career?

I moved from India to the UK 9 years ago. My initial exposure to the M25 was only through the newsletters and events that were shared with us. When I attended some of those events and enjoyed them and learnt so much from them, I developed a sense of purpose in planning and rolling out these programmes for our information professionals. coupled with my experience across countries, libraries and roles motivated me to become a part of the M25 Task Group. Building connections, collaborating on projects and sharing knowledge and experiences has not only increased visibility but has helped shape the direction of my career in librarianship.
