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Report from the M25 Diversity Group event

EDI and libraries: learning from each other to make real change

18 November 2025

The M25 Diversity Working Group alongside Beth Montague-Hellen held a workshop in November to update attendees on the findings of the 2024 survey on diversity initiatives in libraries and to hear some practical tips from Beth on equality, equity, diversity and inclusion.

The survey has eight recommendation areas for the Consortium and member institutions to consider working on. These include areas like networks, recruitment practices and digital presence. You can read the full report here.

Essential Takeaways

Beth's workshop covered a wide amount of

information and below are some of the key takeaways we had from the workshop:

- Belonging is key and a stronger word than inclusion - belonging is being accepted and respected for the person you are.
- Situating yourself on the academic wheel of privilege is a useful exercise: https://ukrio.org/ukrio-resources/equality-diversity-and-inclusion/academic-wheel-of-privilege/
- There are three sections to allyship:
 Supporters, Allies and Co-Conspirators. We move between these three areas with co-conspirators seeking out opportunities for change and standing up for strangers. Our own knowledge and experience will impact on which type of ally we are for people from different marginalised identities. We need to consider where we do not have the knowledge and what can we do to learn more.
- Examine situations to see whether everyone
 will be treated the same. Example given is of
 someone being able to convince a member
 of staff to waive their fee. Someone else
 with the same reason may not find this an
 approachable thing to do. One ends up
 paying and one does not. Although the
 policy might be fair on paper, the practice
 isn't.
- Just because something works for you, that does not mean it works for everyone.

Listening is key and understanding what action you need to take.

Cathy Phillpotts: Reflections from my career

Here are some reflections from my career as I prepare for the next chapter - retirement.

Over the years, I have regularly benefited from training and visits offered by cpd25 - especially when I was doing my CILIP Chartership. So when I had the opportunity to join a cpd25 Task Group and help with the organisation of events, I jumped at the chance.

This was while I was working as Team Leader Social Sciences at Senate House Library (2002-2007), so I was ideally centrally placed to be able to attend our Task Group meetings which rotated around the libraries of the Task Group Members. The Operations Task Group (TG3 if I recall correctly) had quite a wide remit and membership of the group enabled me to build my own professional network of colleagues to go to for help, support and to cajole into giving presentations or workshops for cpd25.

On one occasion, Carole Pickaver, our Task Group Chair, was unable to chair the meeting unexpectedly, due to being snowed in - and as the rest of the Group had assembled for our TG3 meeting, I thought we may as well cover at least some of the agenda and report back to Carole later, so I stood in as chair. Maybe this is what caused me to be asked to take over chairing the group when Carole stood down?

I was approached by Mary Nixon (of Goldsmiths at that time) and went to meet her and get more information about what chairing a group would mean (in terms of time, commitments etc). Mary seemed happy that I was up to the task!

When I applied for my first job at London Met in 2007 (Learning Resources Manager for the Commercial Road Library), the interview panel was very interested in my involvement in cpd25, and I think the planning, organising and budgeting skills I had developed were a real aid in the role being offered to me.

Having been promoted into the Director role at London Met Library Services, I then became the M25 Rep for our organisation. Caroline Lloyd (of Birkbeck) was Treasurer at the time and needed to step down. Caroline persuaded me to put myself forward for the role of Treasurer for the M25 Consortium and I was duly elected at the AGM.

At the time, SCONUL had just undertaken a review of membership fees and there had been some changes in Jisc bandings (with a number of institutions moving to lower bands), so one of my first tasks was to produce a new membership fee model, that would take into account the new Jisc bands and any reduction in membership fees that might arise as a result, but still ensure an appropriate level of income to secure the future of the M25 Consortium. I spent many an evening modelling different options! All good experience for financial skills.

Of course, as Treasurer, I was a member of the Steering Group and a Trustee of the Consortium, so again, lots of opportunities to build my own professional network, to liaise with colleagues across the region, to hear about developments in the member libraries and to take away ideas that could be implemented at London Met.

I served as Treasurer for eight years (the maximum allowed) and was subsequently co-opted onto the M25 Steering Group which I have enjoyed immensely! Yes, it has been extra work, but it has also been beneficial to my own personal and professional development. I have met so many fantastic people, some of whom are not just colleagues but friends.

I'm a firm believer that the opportunities from the voluntary work I have done for cpd25 and the M25 Consortium have helped my career significantly and I think all of those who get involved do benefit personally. I mentioned a few names above - and there are so many others (too many to list!) who have been with me on this journey - you know who you are!

It was unexpected and amazing to be called to the front and presented with a gift at the M25 Consortium Networking Event. Thank you!

I'm looking forward to the next chapter (more museum and gallery visits, more motorcycling), but I will miss colleagues and my visits to libraries. You never know - I may pop up from time to time in your libraries.
